

Vladislav Zubok is professor of Contemporary History at the Department of History at Temple University, Philadelphia. He published numerous articles in the leading American historical journals and several books, including the “Inside the Kremlin’s Cold War: From Stalin to Khrushchev” with C. Pleshakov (Harvard, 1996) that won Lionel Gelbert prize, and “A Failed Empire: the Soviet Union in the Cold War from Stalin to Gorbachev” (University of North Carolina Press, 2007) that won the Marshal Shulman prize. His next book “Zhivago’s Children: The Last Russian Intelligentsia” comes out in Harvard University Press in May 2009.

In 1999-2001 Zubok was Director of the Project “Cold War in South Caucasus” at the National Security Archives, George Washington University, and in this capacity organized two international conferences in Tbilisi and Tsinandali, Georgia. He organized a number of seminars and summer schools in Russia, in cooperation with the Kuban State University, Saratov State University, and the State University for Humanities (GUGN). In 2007-08, using a grant from Carnegie Corporation of New York, organized three training sessions “Russia and the World in the 20th century” for junior faculty in humanities and social sciences from Russian regional universities.

Currently Zubok works on the book on Russian cultural historian Dmitry Likhachev that explores the uneasy negotiation between Russia’s European cultural legacy and Russian nationalism.
